

Introducing Dale Perks, BScN, RN

Nurse Clinician and Our Harbour volunteer

I was born in Montreal and raised in Longueuil, along with my five brothers and sister. Our home was always open to everyone, and I grew up loving to be around people, and enjoying being involved with our community. As a teenager, while volunteering to help children with learning disabilities, I realized that I wanted to work in the health domain.

Eventually this led me to attend McGill University and obtain a Bachelor's Degree of Science, in Nursing, as well as a Diploma in Wound Care from the University of Toronto. During my studies, I worked in various psychiatric wards as a "companion" for patients with mental health illnesses. An experience that shaped my future.

My nursing career started at the Montreal General Hospital, and over the course of 37 years I worked in various departments, including the Surgery Clinic, where I was in-charge for the last 20 years before I retired. I can honestly say that being a caregiver of so many people has been the most fulfilling experience of my life!

In 2014, I took a sabbatical from my work to teach Nursing at Champlain College. During that time, I had my first encounter with Our Harbour when I accompanied my nursing students for their community stage with the residents. It was truly a great experience for myself and all my students. That summer, I applied to a volunteer program at Bishops University, called "Praxis Malawi", and was chosen as one of the volunteers to spend six weeks in a remote village in Malawi, Africa, working on an educational and first aid project. Despite the lack of running water and electricity, it was one of the most enriching experiences of my life!

Currently, I am the chairperson for Social Justice with the Catholic Women's League (CWL) Counsel, in Candiac. I proudly co-wrote an important Resolution (2024:01); "Increased Supported Housing for Individuals Experiencing Homelessness with Mental Health and Mental Illness Issues." This fall, the National CWL Executive will meet Ministers of Parliament to inform them of this resolution and to advocate for increased government support.

I am part of a band, called "**The Intonations**", which performed for Our Harbour's 20th Anniversary **RoundUp**! and continue to volunteer with the seniors at the Greenfield Park Chartwell Residence, where I give art and painting classes twice a week.

I am a relatively new volunteer at Our Harbour and have been involved in the **Head-to-Toe Pilot Project** assessing the healthcare needs of residents and assisting them in obtaining necessary health care.

When not volunteering, I enjoy spending time with my husband, two daughters and our four beautiful grandchildren (all under the age of five years!).

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Head-to-Toe Pilot Project up and running!

I wrote about the *Head-to-Toe Pilot Project* in the Spring 2023 issue of *OurHarbourviews* ("Head-to-Toe Checkup Pilot Launched Thanks to the André Gauthier Foundation") and am delighted to share with you the progress that has been made in recent months.

Two volunteers have provided the expertise along with their time and commitment to bring this project to fruition. **Dale Perks**, BSc., RN, has been a Nurse Clinician for more than 37 years in a range of sectors and clinics. **Petra Dando**, DDS, a Board member since 2020, is a retired dentist with more than 39 years of experience, 34 in her own practice. Both have also taught in their professions at Champlain College and McGill University, respectively.

Petra and Dale were introduced to residents at a Resident Committee meeting on September 16, 2024. Residents were invited to complete a general health questionnaire, developed by Our Harbour Assistant, **Savannah Zavitz** with input from **Sabine Bulow** and **Steven Nadeau** of the Resident Care team as well as Dale and Petra.

Four residents completed the questionnaires that day. Petra and Dale met with these residents individually to dig a little deeper into their healthcare history and needs, discuss their priorities before starting the process of exploring, with each individual resident, the appropriate healthcare providers. Residents were accompanied to their appointments.

As a result, one resident has completed an initial check up at the dentist, his first in ten years, and has a follow-up appointment for additional work. In addition, he has had an eye exam and will be ordering new glasses once he has the updated prescription. With encouragement, he has received updated COVID-19 and influenza vaccines.

Another resident, who is studying for professional examinations, has had an eye examination and will also be ordering much-needed glasses. Other participants are seeking help with nutrition and diet information and support, quitting smoking and improving exercise routines.

Health care services that are free through RAMQ, or for residents receiving social welfare are accessed first. For services or health-aids that must be paid for, more affordable options are explored, such *le Bonhomme a Lunettes* for glasses. Where possible, residents must contribute something towards the cost of basic care or needs.

For more costly care that goes beyond what is available through RAMQ or more economical providers, the resident will be invited to make an application to the Pilot Project Team, which includes **Dolly Shinhat**, Director General, both Project volunteers and the Resident Care Team. Again, a financial contribution, however modest, is requested of residents who apply.

Our Harbour is deeply grateful to *Louise Mathieu* and the *André Gauthier Foundation* for funding the Pilot Project and to Dale and Petra for their commitment and leadership.
